



'Establishing a Civil Society Alliance around Nutrition in Namibia'

Report on Stakeholder Mapping

October 2018 – August 2019

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1. Background

In the context of establishing a SUN-Civil Society Alliance in Namibia, it is crucial to have an understanding of which civil society actors are active in certain nutrition-related areas and willing to participate in such alliance. This is the main purpose of this stakeholder mapping. For the last 10 years, the Namibian Alliance for Improved Nutrition (NAFIN) has been the multi-sectoral multi-stakeholder nutrition alliance in Namibia, yet it was not very active in the most recent few years.

The Namibian government is currently reviving the Food and Nutrition Security Council (FNCS) and is finalizing the development of its Policy together with an accompanying Action Implementation Plan (AIP). Against the background of these major changes taking place, a fresh and comprehensive approach to civil society actors within the Namibian nutrition and food security landscape seemed most appropriate.

2. Approach

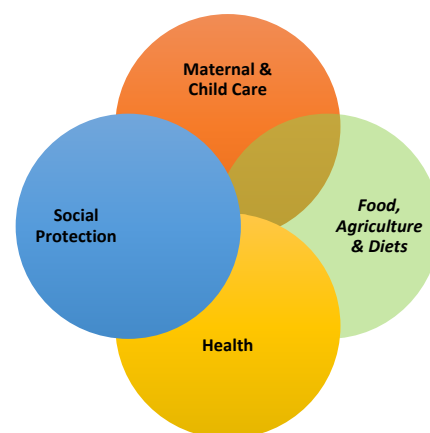
The assignment was divided into the following steps:

- 1) **Desk review**, research and liaising with key stakeholders
- 2) **Preparations** for Stakeholder Engagement, e.g. developing and updating of questionnaire, collecting contact details of potential civil society organisations, and identifying most suitable database software/platform
- 3) **Engagement** of civil society stakeholders and **data capturing** and consolidation

2.1. Desk Review

The first step in this mapping was to identify a suitable framework for nutrition and food security that on the one hand would be comprehensive enough to capture the complexity of the topic at hand, while on the other hand will be simple enough for any 'outsider' or 'non-expert' to understand and relate to, i.e. including both nutrition-specific and nutrition-sensitive actions that civil society actors may be involved in.

The best possible framework identified was the *Compendium of Actions for Nutrition* (CAN - <https://www.reachpartnership.org/compendium-of-actions-for-nutrition>), developed in collaboration with UN Partner Agencies by the UN Network for the SUN/REACH Secretariat and launched in 2016.



The four different sections within this Compendium provide a good overview of the different nutrition-related aspects, which were then slightly adapted and simplified, to be used for communication and mapping purposes.

Review of existing materials and consultations (*see lists on p. 21*) with key local stakeholders revealed that the understanding of nutrition in Namibia so far seemed to have been rather limited, which confirmed the usefulness of a broader approach, which would then also link with the soon to be set up FNSC and the future policy.

2.2. Preparations

The first step was to develop a **suitable questionnaire** (*see pp. 13-20*) based on the selected framework (CAN), yet adapted to the Namibian context and rephrased in such a way that also those who aren't familiar with nutrition-related interventions will understand and may see the relevance of their work in relation to nutrition and food security.

A first version of this questionnaire was finalized by early December 2018. It was later updated in March 2019., including specific links to all areas of the Food and Nutrition Policy (final draft) in close collaboration with the Office of the Prime Minister,

Secondly, a **comprehensive list of potential civil society organisations** was being compiled by consulting a variety of sources, including previous NAFIN databases and relevant existing contact lists from other Namibian CSOs and umbrella organisations, such as NANGOF.

Given that within the current Namibian context, no other networks (such as for the business sector or for academic institutions) exist, academic and private sector organisations were also included into this comprehensive list for the purpose of this mapping process.

Details on this list had to be updated and corrected to ensure correctness of contact details, and the final list (*see pp. 22-26*) consisted of a total of 194 Civil Society Organisations, 10 Unions, 2 Academic Institutions, 6 Business Entities and 15 recommended individuals.

Lastly, an **appropriate database software/platform** had to be found, which would not only enable capturing of the collected data but would allow for easy access and future use of collected data on national and subnational level during future collaborations with the FNSC. For instance, such database should allow for easily identifying and filtering all organisations working in a specific region and/or a specific field.

After initial attempts to have such database solution be programmed from scratch, it seemed much more convenient and reliable to use the already established platform "Kohezion" - <https://www.kohezion.com> where registered and authorized users can access this specific database here: https://nsun-csa.kohezion.com/app_k.jsp (*password protected*).

2.3. Engagement and Data Capturing

Given the scope and timeframe of this stakeholder mapping, contacting CSOs and other organisations was limited to primarily email communication and occasional telephonic follow-up and verification calls.

The **first version of the questionnaire** was sent by early **December 2018**, together with one follow-up email. At the time, only five (5) responses were received. A major explanation for this low number of responses could be the close proximity of the long Namibian summer holidays at the time of sending the first questionnaire. That time of year many organisations are extremely busy and/or preparing themselves to close over the long holidays.

The second and **last round of engagement between April and July 2019** led to significantly more responses.

Almost 40 responses were received, and a total of **27 CSA-relevant organisations** provided details that have been captured by now in the **online database**.

3. Outcomes

The stakeholder engagement between December 2018 and July 2019 resulted in about 40 responses from civil society organisations, academia and private sector organisations, and it led to 27 entries on the new online-database: https://nsun-csa.kohezion.com/app_k.jsp

Access to this online database is now with the project (currently managed by Synergos Trust Namibia), so that it can continue to serve the future Civil Society Alliance in growing and organizing itself, and in taking coordinated action together with the future Namibian Food and Nutrition Security Council.

This online database contains **relevant information of each organization**, capturing all details asked for in the questionnaire (*see fields for data capturing on p. 27*). It is searchable for a variety of single and combined factors, e.g. focus areas, geographic areas of activities, type and size of organization etc., so that if one is looking for organisations working in particular areas, one will be able to easily find them. Each search provides a 'report' which can be exported, i.e. shared via email and can also be printed (*sample report, pp. 28-33*). Such reports can even be made available publicly, if needed.

Based on experiences with the organisations captured so far, other organisations can easily be added as part of the establishment and ongoing work of the future Civil Society Alliance.

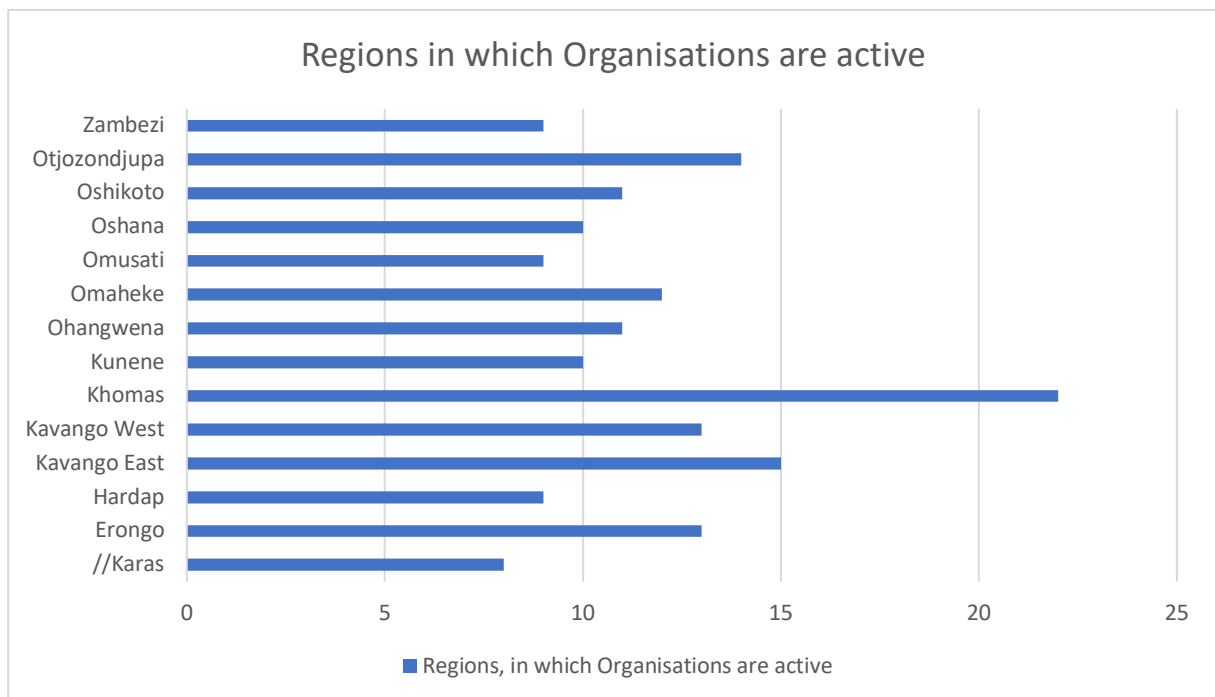

3.2. Database

3.2.3. Other Nutrition-related Working Areas

The following lists responses from organisations in addition to the categories provided in the questionnaire. These responses show the great variety and wide range of activities around nutrition and food security in Namibia.

These responses also demonstrate the huge potential for taking nutrition-related action in the future as a Civil Society Alliance.

An empowered African Youth Network on Population and Development in the fore front of Africa's development. Our mission is to coordinate national youth networks and to give impetus for advocacy, resource mobilization to improve youth quality of life

African Youth and Adolescent Network Namibia (AfriYAN Namibia)

Many autistic children have restricted diets, thus we try and teach and train parents and other caregivers / teachers / class assistants on how to introduce new foods, etc so that the child can improve their diet. Many autistic children/persons are sensitive to certain foods and foodstuff, thus we inform and train parents about alternatives, eg. Gluten free; Casein free. Information on necessity of having blood tests done to determine food sensitivities. Inform about leaky gut syndrome.

Researching and/or assisting with any other questions that might arise around autism and feeding.

Autism Association of Namibia

Looking at nutrition among Namibian communities is a welcome idea as quality early childhood nutrition is linked to excellent brain development and a high IQ. The poor performance of school learners may have something to do with poor quality nutrition.

Cornelia Ndifon Rural Health Foundation (CNRHF)

Institutional food handler and operates with informal sector. Provide members with access to rural or urban land.

Support self-help groups with backyard gardens and small livestock

David Kasume Community Development Organisation (DKCDO)

Goat and chicken farming, egg production, vegetable gardening, planting of fruit trees are part of the child aid projects and training at the DAPP vocational training school. The child aid projects also take care of orphans or children with disabilities (to get national documents and welfare grants).

DAPP projects would be interested in doing more, and therefore training opportunities for staff members and community volunteers would be welcome. Very often lack knowledge while the will to make improvements is there.

Development Aid from People to People (DAPP)

Our network includes amongst others 5 homes for older people (target group high end of lower income bracket & middle income bracket) and add value to the care of older people in low income bracket at least at five of our programmes. Furthermore give direct support or facilitate (conduit) support to 23+ pre-schools in remote rural areas, especially the SAN/Bushmen people of Omaheke and Otjison djupa.

Busy with the establishment of a social enterprise (Oondoongi Gardens) to aid the training and employment of unemployed youth & women, homeless people and refugees.

A number of our affiliated embers active in this field – include activities in Keetmanshoop, Gochas, Koes, Aranos, Gobabis, Drimiopsis, Grootfontein, Tsumkwe, Mangettiduin, Tsintsabis, Kavango-East, Kunene Region (deep into Kaokoland and Damaraland) , Outjo, Walvis Bay, Swakopmund, Windhoek, Okahandja – distribution of donated food and some of it feeding schemes.

Any comments, recommendations or suggestions? We are actively looking for Namibian partners in the private sector – the present state of the economy affects all efforts

We are actively looking for Namibian partners in the private sector – the present state of the economy affects all efforts.

Ecumenical Social Services (EcSOS)

Farm Okukuna was established by the City of Windhoek and the World Future Council to improve food and nutrition security in Namibia's capital.

Farm Okukuna

We are interested in participating in training and networking sessions and workshops, as well as in receiving information and/or education material around nutrition

KAYEC Trust

Interested in any other activities in nutrition-related areas. Interest or active involvement might not always be the organization, but individuals working for the organization, for which provision should be made in the future Civil Society Alliance.

Men on the Side of the Road (MSR)

Solar cooking is our main area of expertise. We could do much more in our programs to promote the health benefits of solar cooking and not just the energy saving component.

Our Environmental Education programs touch on nutrition especially through solar cooking and fuel-efficient stove cooking. Our interest is in educating in the "nutrition sensitive" areas. We are interested in teaching about water saving on household level yet improving hygiene. Usage of dry sanitation. These are all part of NaDEET Centre programme. We currently have a PhD student comparing household energy usage focused on cooking in communities that we have worked with. We are happy to share this and past & future research in the field of food preparation related to sustainable technologies.

Namib Desert Environmental Education Trust (NaDEET)

Work of the environmental NGOs is to promote the underlying framework of sustainable food supply (crops, indigenous biodiversity, reducing HWC) and supporting livelihoods.

Conservation (minimal tillage) agriculture – enhancing crop production in the north & north-east.
Inland fisheries management – working with communities to manage fish via fish reserves on the Zambezi and Okavango rivers, with a particular focus on access to fish by women and children in local communities.

Communal conservancies – with own-us meat production and other forms of income from wildlife a core objective of the program, to improve livelihoods at the same time as sustainably managing wildlife and other natural resources.

Urban land – providing affordable ownership of minimally serviced urban land.

Test and roll out appropriate affordable sanitation options in low-income and informal housing areas that meet local cultural and environmental requirements.

Reducing human-wildlife conflict in rural areas – particularly in communal conservancies.

Support to women's craft groups, in parallel with ensuring that the plant resources for basket making are managed sustainably, to ensure the long-term sustainability of the craft sector – where benefits go directly to women.

Namibia Chamber of Environment (NCE)

"Pediatric health and Immunization & HIV/AIDS services" - This is our core areas of work as an organization. Focus on the promotion of local food.

We are:

- working with adolescent on sexual reproductive health and rights program which looks at various aspects of reproductive health.
- currently working on a project on MNCH and NCDs in Kavango East and West and Hardap.
- have a project focusing on these issues but not focusing on IYCF and ECD.
- interested to complete the package by integrating this piece.
- working with adolescent already and often connect with HAMU on school feeding program.
- some work happening under COHENA in Omaheke region for TB patients (animal sources food production)

Namibia Network of AIDS Service Organizations (NANASO)

Humanitarian organization delivering sustainable services and ensuring dignity for the most vulnerable by mobilizing networks of community volunteers.

Provide support to women self-help groups with small livestock (chickens) farming.
Provide support for backyard farmers in the Kavango East and West and the Zambezi regions.

Namibia Red Cross Society (Red Cross)

We are a non-profit organization which relies on donors to carry out activities and at times, hosts worship evenings and beauty pageants to generate funds. Lobbying with NANASO where possible with issues pertaining to the awareness giving and empowering the community where necessary.

Namibian Christian Apostles & Prophet Association

Development of Information Material and engaging Media Practitioners around Nutrition. OCDF's core mandate is Community Development in the Omaheke Region. We also intend to reach out more to engage the Regional Leadership and Traditional Authorities in Omaheke Region, as well as the rural and vulnerable communities.

Omaheke Community Development Foundation (OCDF)

We operate as a day care and early intervention centre for families of children with special needs in a very poor community. Our Mission is to provide early childhood development in children with special needs, to train parents as well as the community and caregivers.

Side by Side Early Intervention Centre

In Osire Refugee Settlement where we are much anticipating and other reception areas for Asylum seekers and other people of interest like Internal Displaced persons capacity building needs to be shared at a high level. Community Development Officers need to be employed at points to assess the situation and to see how best the nutrition around specified areas can be improved.

Southern Africa Refugee Protection (SARP)

Our volunteers monitor the nutrition of children at Hostels.

We had a project for hygiene and hand-washing at a school in Gobabis 2018, and capacity building for educators in Omaheke Region.

Suni e.V.

We think this is a good initiative to educate the nation about health lifestyle to reduce nutrition deficiency that will lead to many ailments. Together we can make a difference.

Uhili Necessity Wellness Trust

We work with young women leaders in 10 San communities in Namibia, and support the Namibian San Council. We wish to support them with information on nutrition, advocacy for improved food aid, improved access to state services such as ECD and school feeding programs, as well as the development of food gardens and climate change activities.

San leaders are demanding that the "San Feeding Programme" (this name is already derogatory!) be stopped and their communities benefit from the Food Banks, which provide a greater variety of nutritious foods.

They reject being called "Marginalized Communities" and want to be mainstreamed in all state services in order to overcome marginalization. Being labeled marginalized under the auspices of the non-functioning Department for Marginalized Communities in the Office of the President simply reinforces and perpetuates their marginalization.

4. Ways Forward

Overall, this process of mapping relevant stakeholders in the Namibian nutrition and food security fields seems to have been helpful in the process of establishing a Civil Society Alliance. However, it needs to be understood as an ongoing work in progress.

Continuous engagement of various actors from civil society, academia and private sector is recommended, because although some of the organisations contacted have responded and indicated interest to be involved, yet they didn't submit their details within the period in which this stakeholder mapping was conducted.

It is also recommended to keep trying to contact all those organisations listed on pp. 22-26 who have not yet responded, as they might nevertheless be interested to be engaged once the establishment of the Civil Society Alliance has advanced to the next level/s.

Lastly, there may also be other additional organisations which are active within Namibia, especially smaller CSOs working in the regions, as well as smaller academic institutions and various private sector organisations, all of which should be engaged by the future Civil Society Alliance as part of their ongoing outreach and organisational growth and development process.

The questionnaire and online database, established as part of this stakeholder mapping, may be useful and flexible tools to keep track of the various stakeholders and their areas of activities. The existing online database at <https://www.kohezion.com> will remain active, accessible and modifiable at least until end of 2020. All access and account details will be passed on to the future secretariat, board and/or management of the Civil Society Alliance. This active online database may therefore serve the future Food and Nutrition Security Council in coordinating their activities with civil society actors.

In addition, it may even serve as inspiration for similar online database structures to be established and used by the FNSC itself.

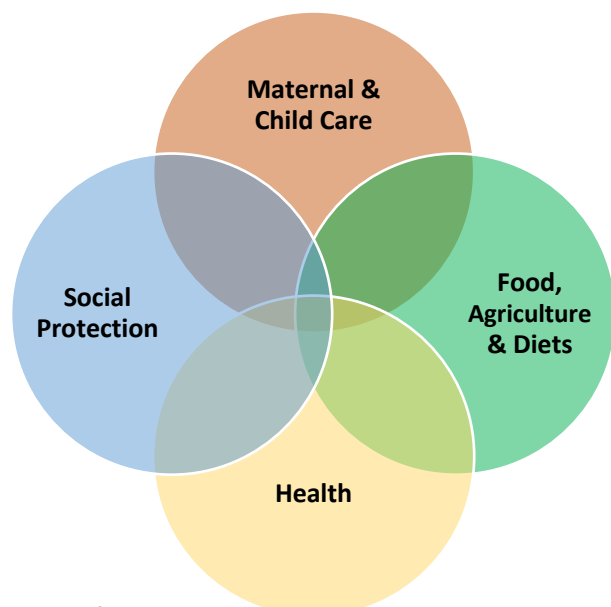
